Third Reading


Luke 23:20-27

²⁰ Pilate, wanting to release Jesus, addressed them again, ²¹ but they kept shouting, "Crucify, crucify him!" ²² A third time he said to them, "Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no ground for the sentence of death; I will therefore have him flogged and then release him." ²³ But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be crucified, and their voices prevailed. ²⁴ So Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. ²⁵ He released the man they asked for, the one who had been put in prison for insurrection and murder, and he handed Jesus over as they wished. ²⁶ As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming from the country, and they laid the cross on him and made him carry it behind Jesus. ²⁷ A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him.

Confession

When we follow in the steps of Jesus, we say yes to bearing his cross— not because there is any kind of value in suffering, not to prove our selflessness, nor because God wills it, but because living as Jesus lived makes the cross inevitable. So together, let us pray:

Jesus, when we side with you, we side with all who threaten the status quo.

When we refuse the call to see others' struggles as our own, we abandon our kin to shoulder their crosses alone. So, we pray,

O God, embolden us to accept the risks that come with following youeven as we resist the powers and systems that set crosses on our shoulders. Amen.

Luke 23:39-43

³⁹One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" ⁴⁰ But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? ⁴¹ And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." ⁴² Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom." ⁴³ He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise."

Preparing for the Final Reading

We have come to our final reading: Luke's version of Jesus' dying moments. Jesus does not die quietly; he cries out and shouts his last words to the Parent God. After he dies, the crowd of his fellow poor and oppressed Jews make noise too, beating their chests in grief as they leave the scene. The Gospel of Matthew even reports the earth quaking. Before we join Jesus for his last breaths, I want to prepare you for two sensory experiences that will occur in our final reading: First, the last candles will be extinguished, leaving us in near darkness. Second, there will be several loud sounds during and directly after the reading. The sounds that will happen during the reading are the ripping of fabric, and a loud voice shouting Jesus' last words. After the reading is over—and this is where all of you get involved—we will recreate the crowd's grief and earth's quaking: at that time, please join us in stomping your feet, patting your knees, or any other movements that feel right for your body. Finally, a bell will ring three times; this will signal the time to stop our noise and move into a long moment of silence.

Fifth Reading

Luke 23:44-46, 48

⁴⁴It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, ⁴⁵while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. ⁴⁶Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Having said this, he breathed his last. ⁴⁸And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this spectacle saw what had taken place, they returned home, beating their breasts.

A bell tolls three times. Please be seated if you are standing.

And now, let us sit in the silence of death.

I encourage you to take some time on Holy Saturday to read it, and to sit with your own troubles, fears, and griefs as you remember the day that God lay dead in a tomb, accompanying us even into death.

Blessing and Sending

As we leave communal worship to enter deeper into this liminal space between life, death, and life again, go with the knowledge that the Triune God— who fashioned you with love, whose Spirit breathes in and through you, and who shares in our every sorrow and every joy— goes with you, even in doubt, even in death, even to the end of the age. Go in peace, and in silence, to wait with those who wait, and mourn with those who mourn.

Amen.
