Greeting & Preparation for Worship

As people arrive and settle into their places at the tables, quiet background music is played to set the tone for the space.

Everyone who answered Jesus' call to follow him found their lives upended. Leaving their livelihoods behind, they leaned into an upside-down way of thinking, one that centers impoverished and oppressed people in place of the rich and powerful.

On the fateful night when Jesus gathered his closest friends for one last meal, the disciples' lives were upended once again. Jesus invited them into a liminal space, a threshold between his life of teaching with them at his side, and the approaching reality of his arrest and death. In this space, they were called to reimagine supposed opposites: power and weakness, fear and hope, innocence and guilt, life and death.

We too will linger in in-between spaces and challenge dualistic thinking. Just as the disciples did, we will share a meal, talk together, and sing. Or you can simply listen if you choose, allowing the music to wash over and into you.

Tonight, and tomorrow night, we will be following Jesus from the Table to the Garden of Gethsemane and all the way to the cross, we will also read between the lines of scripture to imagine parts of the story through the eyes of figures who are often overlooked. After all, Jesus spent most of his time with the people who slip through cracks in society.

Come, let us join Jesus in his final days.

*Call to Worship

We have come to worship the Trinity,

*Call to Confession

Friends in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to struggle against sin, death, and the devil—

God never wearies of forgiving sin and giving the peace of reconciliation.

On this night let us confess our sin against God and our neighbor and enter the celebration of the great Three Days reconciled with God and with one another.

Prayer of Confession

Most merciful God,
we confess that we are captive to sin
and cannot free ourselves.
We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ,
have mercy on us.
Forgive us, renew us, and lead us,
so that we may delight in your will
and walk in your ways,
to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

Words of Forgiveness

God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ. By grace we have been saved.

THE WORD

God Speaks to Us in Scripture Reading, Preaching and Song

First Reading Luke 22:7-13

⁷ Then came the day of Unleavened Bread, on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. ⁸ So Jesus sent Peter and John, saying, "Go and prepare the Passover meal for us that we may eat it." ⁹ They asked him, "Where do you want us to make preparations for it?" ¹⁰ "Listen," he said to them, "when you have entered the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you; follow him into the house he enters ¹¹ and say to the owner of the house, 'The teacher asks you, "Where is the guest room, where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?" ' ¹² He will show you a large room upstairs, already furnished. Make preparations for us there." ¹³ So they went and found everything as he had told them, and they prepared the Passover meal.

God Feeds Us with the Presence of Jesus Christ.

Invitation to Christ's Table

The Last Supper shows us who is welcome at Christ's table: People who sometimes trust, and sometimes question, who are sometimes fearful, sometimes bold.

Liars and backsliders, doubters and deniers,

and those who still struggle to get free of what the world calls power, but commit to revolution anyway.

Impulsive people. Imperfect people.

People who mess up over and over—but try again, and again, and again.

In short: each and every one of us.

So let no one ever tell you that you are not welcome here:

Jesus wants you at his table, exactly as you are.

Great Prayer of Thanksgiving / A Litany of [in] Between

Here in this place, we join Jesus in the sacred space between his last supper and his last breath.

We'll stick with him through his suffering just as God is present in our own liminal moments, sharing our pain, feeling all we feel with us... ... on that night many years ago.

Amen.

and deliver us from evil.


For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.

Breaking of the Bread

Instructions for sharing the feast around tables.

The Last Supper was an intimate gathering of close friends, where anxiety for the future blended with conversation and song. Our Communion feast tonight will hold these elements too.

We invite you to serve each other, passing the elements from person to person around the table. One person at your table can begin by taking the bread and cup and turning to the person on their right, saying a blessing such as, "The bread of life; the cup of salvation." That person will take and eat one piece of bread and one of the communion cups. Then, they will take the bread and cup/s and serve the person to their right until everyone has been fed.



Prayer After Communion

As Jesus nourishes us with his very body, we become the Body of Christ.

May this feast fuel us for the work of joining others in their in-betweens.

Continuing the Feast

Friends, this is a joyful feast...we will invite you to discuss it at your tables.

Second Reading Luke 22:24-27

²⁴ A dispute also arose among them as to which one of them was to be regarded as the greatest. ²⁵ But he said to them, "The kings of the gentiles lord it over them, and those in authority over them are ..called benefactors. ²⁶ But not so with you; rather, the greatest among you must become like the youngest and the leader like one who serves. ²⁷ For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one at the table? But I am among you as one who serves.

After reading the scripture:

We will now discuss this passage together. You will find the text as well as discussion questions in your bulletins. When you hear the ringing of a bell, please bring your conversations to a close and we will continue our worship, leaving the upper room to follow Jesus toward the cross.

Group Conversation

The recommended discussion length is 5-10 minutes. Invite worshipers to choose a prompt to discuss at their tables.

- 1. How do you think Jesus would define power?
- 2. What does it mean for the greatest to become the least, and for the leader to be like a servant?
- 3. How can our faith community, or the whole Church, lean into Jesus' servant model of leadership?
- 4. Have there been times when you felt you had to be the greatest, the holiest, the most pious— or that you were not holy enough or good enough? How do you work through those feelings?

Reader A rings a bell three times to signal the end of the conversation time.

Journeying to the Cross

After their meal, Jesus and his friends leave the haven of the upper room and make their way to the Mount of Olives. Once they arrive, Jesus will pray in deep anguish over what is about to happen, so much so that the scripture describes him as "sweating blood." As we leave the Last Supper behind and follow Jesus ever closer to the cross, we will sing the words "stay with me." We might imagine Jesus singing these words to his disciples, asking them to stay close by. These words are also a reminder to each of us to continue to stay present even as we enter the painful parts of Jesus' final hours.
